Community Advisory Group Gives Input

► **Representatives from area schools and the cities we serve offer their perceptions.**

The annual Community Advisory Group was held on Tuesday, September 26, in the Culinary Arts Cafe.

About 30 members of the community provided input on the draft Strategic Plan and offered their perceptions of the college.

As a whole, the comments were positive, with the participants mainly pointing out that the college is headed in the right direction.

Those attending, which included area school superintendents and business leaders, wanted to build even stronger ties with the college and suggested greater outreach efforts to junior high school students.

The event was first held last year.

Visitors from Japanese Dental Hygiene School Visit Cypress

The Dental Hygiene Department hosted 22 Japanese dental hygiene students, two faculty members, two interpreters and a tour guide from UEDA in Nagano, Japan on September 19.

The visiting students learned about the Cypress College Dental Hygiene program, and got an overview of the dental hygiene profession in the United States, including the job market.

According to Bonna Campellone, dean of Health Sciences, the day's highlights included an hour of close observation by the visiting students of our students providing care in the campus clinic, and students performing impressions of the teeth in the Dental Materials Laboratory. Cypress College students also gave 15-minute presentations on the proper techniques of teeth brushing and scaling procedures.

The guests had prepared questions in English for a question-and-answer period, which was especially enjoyable for Dental Hygiene faculty because it included such queries as: "What kind of sweet is most familiar in the U.S.?"

The Hospitality and Travel Careers Department planned a cultural lunch in the Culinary Arts Cafe and Flight Attendant students were also involved in the experience.
