Current Enrollment Almost Identical with Fall 2004 Numbers

► With the number of students just about even, second "Half-Semester" classes represent an opportunity to meet our growth target.

The number of students enrolled on campus this semester is nearly identical to the headcount one year ago — an indication that efforts to help students navigate through the various construction zones have paid off.

In fact, the added TLC may actually be helping bring more students into the college, since more students enrolled after the start of classes this year than the number of students who enrolled after the start of classes in fall, 2004.

That news is good because it comes as the college has incentive from the state to expand enrollment. The state bases enrollment on a formula known as FTES (for "Full-Time Equivalent Students"), which essentially represents the total units students are enrolled in divided by a full-time course load of 15 units.

FTES figures aren't yet available because of the complexity of the computations needed to figure the ratio. An early indicator will be the numbers calculated for semester-length classes — something that should be available soon. More difficult to project are the FTES figures for late-starting courses and positive attendance classes.

With a total current enrollment of more than 13,000 students, the upcoming second "Half-Semester" classes will play a vital role in meeting the growth target.

The scaffolding around the Library/Learning Resource Center is coming down, and, shortly, the building's exterior will look complete as the glass is installed. Progress is also apparent on the interior of the L/LRC with crews installing the framing for drop ceilings and already finishing some of the internal walls. Move-in is still scheduled to be completed in January, 2006.

Completion of the Central Plant is also nearing. Crews are installing an enclosure around the stacks on the piazza, and the total project should be done by mid-October.

Renovation of the piazza will take place in three phases. The bids for the project were opened this week, and a contractor was selected to advance to the Board for condideration of approval. Work on the elevator for the front of the current Library resumed this week. The project is on schedule to be completed in November.

Meanwhile, as construction costs escalate, concern about the actual cost to build the new Student Center grows. There are strong indications that Hurricane Katrina will drive costs up even further. Bids for construction of the Student Center will be solicited in November.

BRIEFLY

Effective September 1, 2005, the standard mileage rate was increased to 48.5 cents per mile. This is an 8cent increase per mile over the prior rate. The mileage rate applies to the time period in which the miles are driven and not the date in which the miles are claimed for reimbursement. All mileage claims will be adjusted to ensure that each employee is reimbursed the appropriate rate based on the date driven. 
